

ARMY AND NAVY ACES DINE

Eight Hundred Former Aviators In World War Hold a Reunion.

About 800 former army and navy aviators in the World War attended the Armistice Night reunion dinner in the Hotel Commodore. Every State in the Union was represented in the gathering. Fairfax Dillon made a special trip here from Paris to attend the dinner, arriving yesterday on the Aquitania.

Rear Admiral W. F. Fullam was toastmaster, and those who made brief impromptu speeches included "Eddie" Rickenbacker, America's leading ace; Laurence La Tourette Driggs, founder of the American Flying Club, and Brig. Gen. William Mitchell, Chief of Operations, United States Air Service. One of the features of the dinner was a snake dance, in which the 800 diners participated.

At 11 o'clock the lights went out and taps were sounded to the memory of the fliers who lost their lives in the service. Motion pictures of airplanes were flashed on the ceiling during this ceremony.

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
